Victorian Christmas At The WW&F by Paul Lodge


On Saturday, December 18, several club members went to Alna for the Victorian Christmas at the two-foot narrow gauge Wiscasset, Waterville & Farmington Railway. Tom Coulombe, Ed Leslie, and Paul Lodge captured much of the event on video, which Paul will edit into a TRAIN TIME show.

The free rides started at 11 a.m. and continued all day until 5 p.m. The sun went down shortly after 4 p.m. and it was dark by the time the last run was made. On that trip, John Robertson and other WW&F volunteers used lanterns to light the train and signal the engineer and conductor.

Because of the beautiful day and good publicity, there were hundreds of guests. It was estimated that two to three times as many people came to this event as have visited in the past. On each four-mile round trip from the Sheepscot Station to the Alna Station, the train carried about 150 passengers. In addition to the two coaches they usually use, the WW&F crew added a caboose and open air car after the first run of the day.

Club member Bryce Weeks is a regular at the WW&F. After having one ride as a passenger on the train, Bryce rode in the cab of some of the other engines as they moved rolling stock around the yard. Of particular interest to Ed & Brenda Leslie was the Model T scratch built rail car, which was used only in the yard. Steam engine number 10 was used to transport the guests. Because this year's lack of snow made the usual sleigh rides impossible, passengers were given wagon rides from the Alna Station through the nearby fields.

Although trains had run on the line earlier, the G-scalers postponed their official ceremony until more people could attend. Following Dick Clark's invitation, many club members had brought cameras to preserve memories of the occasion.

Ed Leslie, whose preliminary architectural drawing of the lavout hangs on the wall in the main hallway, had the honor of being the first to hammer the golden spike. While Dick Clark and Paul Lodge took video of this historic event, additional members of the G-scale group took turns driving the golden spike. Other club members were then invited to take a few whacks.

The group's objective had been to have at least one line operating during the ExTRAINaganza in Novem-They actually had three trains running for the event, with two trains on the large layout and one train on the small section between the doors to the room. Now that the Ex-TRAINaganza is over and the golden spike has been driven, the group will meet to decide on their next major objective.

TRAIN TIME GOES NATIONAL by Paul Lodge

During the past year, J. P. Fortier of Mount Blue Local Community Television in Farmington has uploaded nearly one hundred (out of our current 228) TRAIN TIME shows to PEGmedia in Rockland. About two years ago, Bob Nichols of Rockland developed a media transfer process to allow public access cable television stations to share locally created programs with other stations. More than 1,000 stations and producers currently provide PEGmedia with a wide variety of programming which they offer to local cable channels throughout the country. By downloading programs from this media exchange, stations can provide more options for their viewers.

PEG is an acronym for the different types of public access cable television stations which local communi-

ties can have. "P" represents "public," "E" is for "Education," and "G" signifies "Government" programming. Communities can choose to have any one of the three types of stations, or their local station may carry all three kinds of programming.

PEGmedia allows stations to download one episode or an entire series of programs. Some stations download each episode during the week they plan to show it. One station in Tennessee has already downloaded all of our shows which are now available.

TRAIN TIME has been downloaded by stations in at least twenty different states, including all New England states except Rhode Island. TRAIN TIME has been downloaded by public access television stations in eight New Hampshire towns: Cheshire, Concord, Newmarket, Enfield,

Bristol, Derry, Hudson, and Nashua. Massachusetts stations in Boxford, Cambridge, Amherst, Revere, Granby, Spencer, Leominster, and Wales have downloaded TRAIN TIME. In Vermont, shows have been downloaded in Windsor, Stowe, Jeffersonville, Cambridge. Falls Area and by two stations whose locations were not identified.

Episodes of *TRAIN TIME* have also been downloaded by stations in the following states: Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee. Texas. and Wisconsin.

THE BASICS OF MODELING by Paul Lodge

The Great Falls Model Railroad Club offers a six-week course twice a year in the basics of modeling. In this short introductory course, students of all ages learn (or review) how to build benchwork by constructing a 4' x 8' module, which they can take to model railroad shows as part of the team's modular layout. For some people this will become their permanent home layout as well. The class also provides an introduction to laying track, wiring the layout, and learning the fundamentals of creating scenery.

Many of the club's current members have taken the class. For

most of the adults who take the class, this is just "the nudge to get you started" as our promotional flyer suggests. Many of them hope to build a permanent home layout, using the skills they have practiced in the class. If you are ready to take that next step, Larry Cannon has some good advice in this newsletter in his article entitled, "The First Lesson of Modeling."

The First Lesson of Modeling by Larry Cannon

The first lesson of modeling is very basic, but so complicated that many people do not master the lesson even after several attempts: know what you are trying to model. The majority of people are so concerned about getting something up and running that they give little concern to what they hope to accomplish.

They may envision a Maine Central branch line from their childhood, but can anvone accomplish that on a flat 4'x 8' sheet of plywood with a Santa Fe F-unit, Bachmann train set? The reality is that you not only need to do research on the models and materials required to build something that meets your expectations, but also to decide what part of your vision you have the space to model. Most people find that their vision exceeds their available real estate - you can have the unfinished basement space, but no trackage rights in the laundry room.

You have to shape your vision to the space, models and materials that are available to support the vision. In the older, more established gauges, this is not as much of an issue as it might be in large scale or Z gauge. The product offerings are more limited in the less popular gauges. In any gauge, the offerings may be limited or expensive depending on what you want to model.

What you can model of a Class 1 railroad (the larger railroads that have become fewer and fewer into the present age) in a small space is often limited to a branch line or a limited portion of the main line with staging areas to represent trains going through your modeled area. You have to consider if such limitations will really keep you happy with your layout before you take the time and effort to build something you end up feeling is a dud. If you

want to hit a home run, take the time, effort, and research to learn how.

If you are reading this article, you have the pathway to the research vehicle. The Great Falls Model Railroad Club has an extraordinary local source of model and prototype railroad materials in our library. We also have a number of members who are pretty good modelers and others who know the technical side of what it takes to run a good layout.

If you are a club member, you already have access to a great resource; if not, we hope you will join. Annual dues are \$25. The small investment of \$25, doing the research, talking and working with those who have made the mistakes (and also have the resultant knowledge) could save you a lot more money and valuable time and result in an effort that you find rewarding.
